Read these facts about Knock together.

Facts about Knock

- Knock is situated in County Mayo and is recognised internationally as a Marian Shrine.
- The apparition at Knock took place on 21 August 1879.
- Our Lady, St Joseph and St John the Evangelist, and a lamb representing Jesus, the Lamb of God, appeared at the parish church in Knock.
- Fifteen witnesses were present at this apparition.
- Pope John Paul II visited the shrine in 1979.
- A novena is held every year in Knock, starting on 15 August.

Our Lady of Knock, you gave hope to your people. You have inspired countless pilgrims to pray with confidence to your divine Son, remembering his promise, 'Ask and you shall receive, seek and you shall find.' 

At Mass We Listen to the Word of God

ABOUT WORDS

We use many words every day. We use words to communicate with one another and to express our feelings. We speak words of welcome, encouraging words, words of praise, angry words and sad words. It is good to reflect on the words we use and on how they affect others. The words we use can help people feel better, but sometimes we can hurt people's feelings by our words. We can also use words to communicate with God when we pray.



ACTIVITY

• Look at the pictures. Chat with the person who sits next to you and decide which words you would say in each situation.

God's words are found in the Bible. The Word of God is read aloud at Mass. Read these lines from Psalm 31:

A Prayer of Trust in God

I come to you, Lord, for protection... My trust is in you, O Lord; you are my God. I am always in your care... Look on your servant with kindness; save me in your constant love.

KEY WORDS

Minister of the Word: the person who proclaims the Word of God at Mass.

Sanctuary: the area at the front of the church where the altar is located.

Cantor: sings the psalms and leads the assembly in singing the parts of the Mass.

Assembly: the people who gather for the Mass.

Lectionary: the book from which the Readings are read at Mass.

Lectern: the stand on which the lectionary is placed.



FOR MEMORISATION

These are the responses that are used during the Liturgy of the Word:

After the Readings **Reader:** The word of the Lord. **People:** Thanks be to God.

Before the Gospel

Priest: The Lord be with you.
People: And with your spirit.
Priest: A reading from the holy Gospel according to (name).
People: Glory to you, O Lord.

After the Gospel **Priest:** The Gospel of the Lord. **People:** Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

A Reading from the Prophet Isaiah (Isaiah 49:15)

The Lord says to his people ..., 'Can a woman forget her own baby and not love the child she bore? Even if a mother should forget her child, I will never forget you.'

Look at the picture above and, as you do, think of the words that God said to his people. Imagine God saying those same words to you.

- At Mass the Liturgy of the Word follows a particular format:
 - The First Reading
 - The Psalm
 - The Second Reading
 - The Gospel Acclamation
 - The Gospel
 - The Homily
 - The Creed
 - The Prayer of the Faithful
- Identify a passage from the Bible that might be read as the First Reading at Mass; the Psalm; the Second Reading and a Gospel reading. Record your choice in your Religious Education journal.

AT HOME

THIS WEEK

The children explored what happens at Mass during the Liturgy of the Word, the part of the Mass that invites us to respond to God's Word. The Liturgy of the Word begins with the First Reading, and this is followed in turn by the Psalm, the Second Reading and the Gospel. The people stand while the Gospel is being read. The Minister of the Word stands at the lectern and reads the Word of God from the Lectionary. The priest sits on the presider's chair when the readings and psalms are being read. The area where the altar is located and where the readings take place is called the sanctuary.

THEME 10: THE MASS | LESSON 2

At Mass We Remember and Give Thanks

ABOUT REMEMBERING, PRESENCE AND THANKSGIVING

We remember and celebrate special events and occasions. Some events happen once in a lifetime but are remembered and celebrated every year. At these celebrations people often share a meal, give a gift and say thanks. At the celebration of Mass we give thanks to God for all that he has done for us. We remember what Jesus did at the Last Supper when he washed the feet of his disciples and gave them the gift of his Body and Blood. Each time we go to Mass we, too, are invited to receive the Body of Christ. The Mass is also called the Eucharist, which means thanksgiving.

- Why do we say thanks to Jesus?

These are some of the words the priest prays at Mass during the Eucharistic Prayer:

At the time he was betrayed and entered willingly into his Passion, he took bread and, giving thanks, broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying:

Take this, all of you, and eat of it, for this is my Body, which will be given up for you.

In a similar way, when supper was ended, he took the chalice and, once more giving thanks, he gave it to his disciples, saying:

Take this, all of you, and drink from it, for this is the chalice of my Blood, the Blood of the new and eternal covenant, which will be poured out for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.

Be thankful

THIS WEEK

The children reflected on the times in their lives when they feel thankful. At Mass those gathered give thanks to God for all he has done for them. They recall the actions of Jesus at the Last Supper when he washed the feet of his disciples and gave them the gift of his Body and Blood. He told them to do what he had done in memory of him.

Read this poem together.

Remember

Remember forever the words Jesus said While filling the wine cups and breaking the bread. 'Remember whenever you do this,' said he, 'Remember to do it in memory of me!' Remember whenever with others you stand And take the communion host into your hand, Whenever your voices are raised in a hymn, Remember you do this in memory of Him.

Next time you visit the church, remember that the Risen Jesus is present in the Blessed Sacrament that is kept in the tabernacle. You can pray to him and thank him for all his gifts to you and your family. The Blessed Sacrament is sometimes placed in the monstrance and left on the altar so that people can come and pray. This is called prayer of adoration.
